


Travel Guy—Mike Maglothin In Iceland

Orbis et Globus (Latin for Circle and Sphere)



Spotlight—Jim McKay

My 43-year journey into Information Management/Information Technology (IM/IT) started in the early 1970s with my employment at Xerox Corporation in Nashville, Tennessee. I started as a Field Service Technician with a service area that covered Federal, State and Local government, but it also included several of the local TV stations and the Grand Ole Opry. I had the opportunity to rub elbows with governors, state legislators, mayors, as well as Johnny Cash, Minnie Pearl, Waylon Jennings, Hank Williams Sr, and many others. A weekly TV show called HeeHaw was filmed at Station5 in Nashville which is a CBS affiliate so many country stars were showcased. After two years in the field, I was promoted to corporate to work with development engineers, to develop ways to make our products faster and easier to service.

unknown, I joined KFC as a Franchisee Consultant opening stores from Kansas to Nevada (east to west) and Montana to New Mexico (north to south). I decided to move to Denver since it was centrally located in my territory, although I was rarely home. I lived out of motels and sometimes drove 500 miles a day. It was nothing for me to turn in a company car with 60000 miles after only two years, but I had the opportunity to see some of the most beautiful scenery on the planet. I opened the first KFC store in the disc storage device, and I en-Navaho Nation, in Chinle, AZ. Two months later I went back to open a second store directly

across the street. Just viewing a sunset in Santa Fe, or Phoenix lets you know there is a God because man could never create such beauty that changed daily.

Denver also allowed me to get back into IM/IT at a company called StorageTek. This company was big on tape storage, but they were also a leader in developing thin film disc storagel. The company was later purchased by Sun Systems and called Sun StorageTek. While there, I had responsibility for the quality of products sold to our third-party customers. Burroughs, Tandem, Texas Instruments, NEC and others purchased our tape drives for use on their systems. Our primary competitor was IBM, and they could never match StorageTek on price or performance. I also had the opportunity to work on the first Robotic Tape Storage Silo. These were silos that could be assem-From Xerox I took a leap into the bled with a robotic arm that could pass and retrieve tapes from silo to silo. The Department outside this big office. As I was of Health and Human Services as well as other large federal government departments were our primary customers.

> Denver led me to San Antonio where I worked for company called Datapoint Corporation. It is often said that Datapoint was the first company network system for shared information dissemination. I do know they had the ability to network as many as campus to house about 20,000 1500 terminals to a common joyed working on the new stuff. We developed an InfraRed Building-to-Building data transfer

technology that the military uses today. My work experience from Xerox came into play when we developed the first Laser Printer that could print on a commercial scale. It was devised of a single print station with up to 80 bin sorters that could be attached. My responsibility as Design Verification Test Manager was to ensure that every new product met or exceeded the design criteria set by the Engineering Standards.

In 1989 I accepted a position at Compaq. What is funny is that I had an interview with Compag in 1983 when the company was housed in the Chasewood Bank building. On the day of the interview, I was shuffled from office to office in Engineering and by the end of the day I was exhausted. I was waiting for my ride to the airport when the HR Rep asked if I had time for one more interview...and I said "yes." I was taken to the top of Chasewood Bank where I sat invited inside, I noticed you could see most of NW Harris County from the window. I sat with this gentleman who had a mustache and cowboy boots and leisurely questioned me...nothing very technical. Toward the end of the interview this gentleman took me over to a window that faced West and all I saw was trees and wetlands. He said they were going to build a employees.

I, again laughingly told him about bringing in a lot of dirt to build the campus. The HR Rep asked if I knew who had just interviewed me and I told him no. He said that was Jim Harris one of the founders of the company. Needless to say, my plane ride back to San Antonio was not a happy one. Compaq did make me an offer in 1983 after that interview and I declined it...I loved San Antonio.

About the quilt:

The quilt is a compilation of shirts, sweatshirts and other Compag cloth memorabilia saved over the years. A friend here in Houston designed the quilt from the stock that I provided, pieced it together so all the spaces would be equal, then stitched it together. The foam backing and bottom stitching was done by a lady in Seguin, Tx that does quilting professionally and has a

plete the intricate topstitching and borders entire process took about six months to complete and miles of thread. I first started thinking about the quilt after my second retirement from HP in 2014 but could not find anyone to take on the challenge. After witnessing the work that it takes to make a custom Queen Size quilt, I have a lot of respect for those that tackle smaller quilts. IT'S A LOT OF WORK!

Post HP/Compaq, I purchased a car wash in 2006 that I sold in 2016. It was always a dream to own this type of business so when I found the right property, I jumped on it. Meeting people daily and helping them was extremely satisfying. I wanted the business to be more like a Cheers where people could come and just sit and discuss the problems of the day. Often times I would still be talking to customers at midnight. Currently I am volunteering at county food banks and mentoring 10 young men in the Houston area—and they have tons of questions about life and business
